29 sent to hospital from Avicii concert in Toronto

The Avicii concert kept Toronto EMS scrambling Saturday night, with at least 29 people ending up in hospital to be treated for illnesses related to alcohol or drugs.



Swedish DJ, remixer and record producer Avicii staged a concert at the Rogers Centre on Saturday night. At least 29 people ended up in hospital, most from illness due to alcohol consumption, Toronto EMS said.

The Avicii concert kept Toronto EMS scrambling Saturday night, with at least 29 people ending up in hospital to be treated for illnesses related to alcohol or drugs.

That number is unusually high, said duty officer George Eliadis. It's not typical for that many people to require hospitalization at that kind of concert.

Rogers Centre had its own medics on site, but staff reportedly became overwhelmed by the number of patrons requiring medical assistance and EMS had to be called.

According to media reports, one person was arrested and at least one other was treated for drug use, but the vast majority became ill to varying degrees as a result of alcohol consumption.

Paramedics said patrons were getting sick before Avicii made it on stage.

The sold-out electronic dance concert welcomed fans of all ages. Approximately 20,000 people piled into the Rogers Centre to see the Swedish DJ.

TORONTO - Some concert-goers took the party too far Saturday night at the Rogers Centre.

Paramedics transported 29 people to hospital from a sold-out concert by Swedish DJ Avicii.

Most became sick by consuming too much alcohol or drugs before the concert, officials said.

"We had a variety of illnesses. This is unusual and we shouldn't be transporting that many away from a site," said EMS deputy commander George Eliadis said Sunday.

The sick are expected to recover.

Toronto Police say charges — such as

public intoxication — may be laid.

Councillor Giorgio Mammoliti speaks out against all-ages shows

Toronto Councillor Giorgio Mammoliti is saying "I told you so" after 29 overindulging youth were sent to hospital from a Rogers Centre all-ages event over the weekend.

Toronto paramedics had to transport partygoers who fell ill to various degrees after consuming alcohol or drugs during a sold-out concert by Swedish DJ Avicii.

Mammoliti has long been a critic of all-ages raves.

"The same promoter (of the Avicii concert) wants to bring 8,000 to Exhibition Place for raves," Mammoliti said, adding such events have to be stopped.

Toronto EMS were called to the Rogers Centre because the private paramedics hired to cover the event were overwhelmed by the number of people who needed to be hospitalized.

"At the next meeting of city council I will be requesting a report from staff on the cost of emergency services and hospital ward beds related to this event," Mammoliti said.

He estimated the cost of dealing with those who fell ill at the show — for an overnight stay at an emergency ward, plus the tab for EMS care — is more than \$100,000.

He argued it's irresponsible to allow children to attend all-ages-events, Mammoliti said.

Alcohol or drug use sent 29 people to hospital with various degrees of illness on Saturday night after an Avicii concert at Toronto's Rogers Centre.

Rogers Centre had its own medics for the sold out, all-ages electronic dance concert and EMS was not on standby, paramedics said. But staff at the 20,000-seat venue quickly became "overwhelmed" by the number of sick patrons, and that's when they called EMS to take over, paramedics said.

"Unfortunately we have a few kids ... excessive alcohol and partying and they can't handle it," EMS commander Peter Rotolo told CP24 on Saturday.

Mammoliti said he'll ask city council to bill Ink Entertainment for the cost of sending EMS to deal with the illnesses.

He also blamed parents for sending their underage children to the concert unaccompanied.

"I want to call out all the irresponsible parents who would let their kids go alone to an event of this nature," Mammoliti said in the statement. "They say it takes a village to raise a child and, as a member of that village, I want to stop the irresponsible decisions made by other parents."

Five people were in serious condition but all are expected to fully recover, paramedics said.

Police arrested one concertgoer and at least one other was treated for drug use, paramedics said.

Paramedics said people began falling ill outside Rogers Centre before the Swedish DJ Avicii came out on stage.

"There's a lot of people here and a few don't spoil it for the rest," Rotolo said.

On Sunday, Toronto city councillor Giorgio Mammoliti blamed promoter Ink Entertainment for making to concert an all-ages event.

"This only proves that it doesn't matter whether these events are held on privately owned or government lands, they are dangerous events to hold as 'all-ages,' allowing

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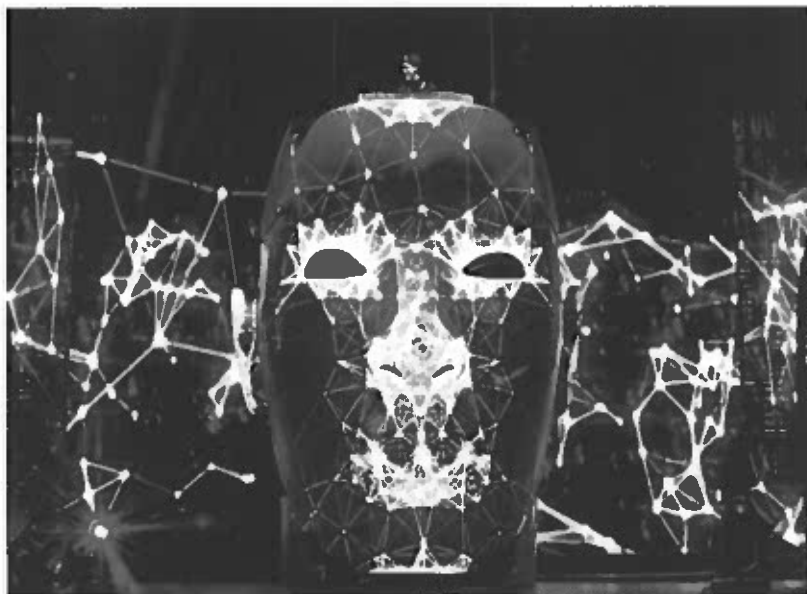
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Avicii's Toronto Show Ends with 29 Hospitalizations

Just because we get Avicii out of the hospital, doesn't mean we need fans and listeners in to replace him, but according to CTV Toronto News, 29 people were sent to the hospital due to alcohol or drug-related illnesses after Avicii's concert at Toronto's Rogers Centre on Saturday Night.

This #TRUETOIR show was an 'All Age Event,' and EMS commander Peter Rotolo said, "Unfortunately we have a few kids...excessive alcohol and partying and they can't handle it."

According to paramedics, five people were in serious condition, but all are expected to fully recover. Further painting a picture of the context and scene of last night's concert, paramedics said people began falling ill outside Rogers Centre before Avicii even came out on stage.

Rogers Centre provided its own medics for the concert, so EMS was not on standby, but the staff at the 20,000-seat venue quickly became "overwhelmed" by the number of sick patrons and called upon EMS to for assistance.

We hope for quick recovery for all individuals involved.

It seems that the incredible hype for Saturday night's sold-out, all-ages Avicii show in Toronto took a turn for the worse, as 29 concert-goers were transported to the hospital from the Rogers Centre to be treated for the effects of alcohol and drugs.

Toronto EMS Commander Peter Rotolo told CP24 that they started receiving several 911 calls for treatment of patients who "overdosed" on alcohol before Avicii even came on stage. According to Rotolo, most of the patients were treated for excessive alcohol consumption, and at least one person was treated for drug use.

The event had hired its own private medical professionals to patrol the twenty thousand party patrons; however, the medical staff became "overwhelmed" with all the emergency cases, so 911 was called for Toronto EMS to assume command.

One arrest was also made in connection with the incident.

Five patients were in serious condition but everyone is expected to make a full recovery, paramedics told CP24.

29 people were reportedly hospitalised at an Avicii gig in Toronto on Saturday night.

Toronto media outlet *CTV News* reports that most were sent to hospital due to excessive alcohol consumption while one concertgoer at the Rogers Centre was treated for drug use.

It is believed that Rogers Centre medics originally treated those that fell ill, five who were in serious condition, but had to call upon the Toronto Emergency Medical Services (EMS) when they became overwhelmed.

Toronto city councillor Giorgio Mammoliti placed the blame with promoter Ink Entertainment, questioning the decision to make it an all-ages event.

"This only proves that it doesn't matter whether these events are held on privately owned or government lands, they are dangerous events to hold as 'all-ages,' allowing kids to be present."

One arrest is also said to have taken place at the event.

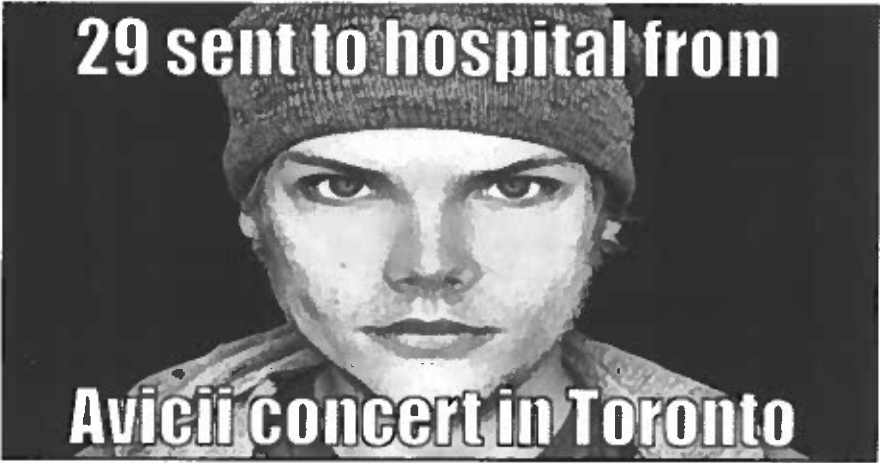

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The Avicii concert kept Toronto EMS scrambling Saturday night, with at least 29 people ending up in hospital to be treated for illnesses related to alcohol or drugs.

That number is unusually high, said duty officer George Esiasis. It's not typical for that many people to require hospitalization at that kind of concert.

Rogers Centre had its own medics on site, but staff reportedly became overwhelmed by the number of patrons requiring medical assistance and EMS had to be called.

According to media reports, one person was arrested and at least one other was treated for drug use, but the vast majority became ill to varying degrees as a result of alcohol consumption.

Paramedics said patrons were getting sick before Avicii made it on stage.

The sold-out electronic dance concert welcomed fans of all ages. Approximately 20,000 people piled into the Rogers Centre to see the Swedish DJ.

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'SNL' EDM sketch becomes reality as 29 are hospitalized at Avicii concert

Over the weekend, satire and reality mirrored themselves a little too closely.

On *Saturday Night Live*'s season finale, host Andy Samberg produced a pitch-perfect excoriation of contemporary EDM culture. He portrayed an overpaid DJ named "Davvincii," likely modeled after Swedish superstar DJ Tim Bergling, a.k.a. Avicii, and spoofed a culture where the DJ does little actual music-making, and the audience just waits for the bass to drop. When the bass does drop, several fans' heads literally explode.



That same night, in Toronto, Bergling played a gig at Rogers Centre, where 29 people were hospitalized.

While no heads exploded, several concertgoers were thought to have become ill after "overdosing" on alcohol and/or drugs. Toronto EMS claimed they transported 10 people to the hospital, but the Rogers Centre also had its own medics on standby for the sold-out, all ages show, and other reports claim 29 people were sent to the hospital, after the venue become "overwhelmed" with sick fans. There was one arrest.

There were no reported deaths, but Toronto city council member Giorgio Mammoliti did place the blame with the promoter for making it all ages. In a press release, he [said](#):

"This only proves that it doesn't matter whether these events are held on privately owned or government lands, they are dangerous events to hold as 'all-ages,' allowing kids to be present."

Bergling didn't mention the incident in his tweets from the night, but it's possible he didn't find out about it.

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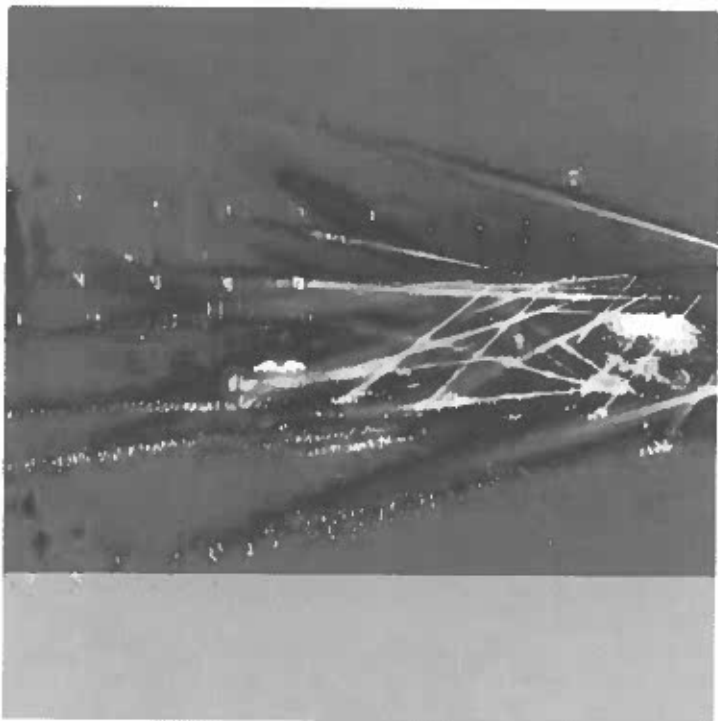

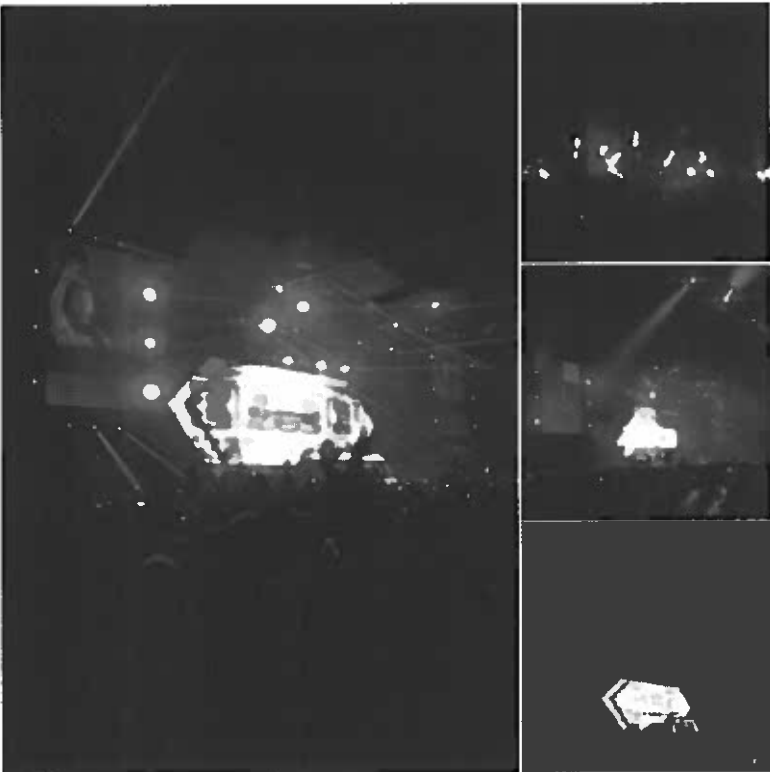

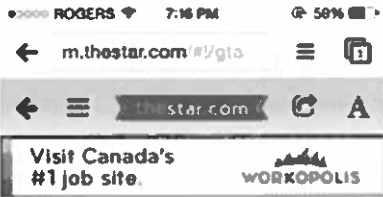
