Subject: **Ontario Quarter Horse Association**

Recommendations:

It is recommended that the Board grant a written forgiveness to the Ontario Quarter Horse Association (OQHA) in the amount of \$26,226.57

Background:

During the past several months, The National Trade Centre, on behalf of the Board, has entered into many discussions with the Ontario Quarter Horse Association regarding the status of their overdue account. During these discussions we have come to the conclusion that the Board should grant forgiveness for the balance of the OQHA's account and write the balance off as a bad debt. This amount was fully provided for in the 1998 operating results.

Discussion:

The recommendation with respect to granting forgiveness to the OQHA comes after reviewing their financial statements for 1998 and letter (See Appendix "A"), which indicates an inability to pay this debt.


The OQHA has been with the Board of Governors for 30 years and have maintained an account of good standing. To show good faith they have made payments of \$2,000.00 and \$4,911.25 in 1999. In 1998 the Board received a net profit of \$141,447.77 net of expenses from rent, parking, services and catering. Therefore the write off of \$26,226.57 reduces our total net profit to \$115,221.20.

We have sought advice from City Legal and they support this recommendation.

Conclusion:


This report recommends that the Board grants forgiveness to the Ontario Quarter Horse Association in the amount of \$ 26,226.57 and writes it off as a bad debt.

Dear Ms. Campbell;

Thank you for your patience in dealing with Quarterama '98's outstanding balance.

As you can see from the enclosed financial statement for O.Q.H.A. for 1998, the Ontario Quarter Horse Association was reliant on a successful show in order to fund much of the Association's operating expenses for each year. With the rather dismal financial results of both Quarterama '97 and Quarterama '98 owing to a number of circumstances, the majority beyond the association's control, the situation has had a major impact on the association. As explained earlier, the association closed their office in Milton last year in order to reduce operating expenses. Publication of the O.Q.H.A. News was suspended until the Accounts Receivable could be brought into line. Work is being done to reduce Printing and Publishing costs of the O.Q.H.A. News as well.


You will see from the Assets List of the O.Q.H.A. Inc., that any assets are limited to a variety of Office Furniture and used Office Equipment with very little resale value. The financial statement does not clearly show that a substantial percentage of the funds indicated on the statement were collected in trust for Drug Testing under A.Q.H.A. Approval.

As requested I have submitted the following as proposed at our meeting with Jeff and yourself:

1. Impact Study as provided with permission from Lynda Harrison Sisson of the Rider.
2. List of O.Q.H.A. Assets
3. Assignment of the 5% rebate on Commercial Exhibitors and Sponsors as provided by the Toronto International Quarter Horse Show to O.Q.H.A. Inc. as per O.Q.H.A.'s agreement with the Toronto International Quarter Horse Show and Ms. Lynn Dillabaugh. (Cheque in the amount of \$4,911.25.)
4. Cheque for \$2,000 provided in good faith from the limited funds of the Association.
5. Agreement to forward any funds collected with regards to outstanding Commercial or Horse Exhibitors from Quarterama '98 to the National Trade Centre.
6. Financial Statement for O.Q.H.A. Inc. for 1998.

The O.Q.H.A. Association Inc. and its Board of Directors would request a written forgiveness of the balance of the outstanding amount shown as owing. This is being asked in light of the release of the dates to the Toronto International Quarter Horse Show providing The National Trade Centre with ongoing rental income and impact to Toronto in 1999 and future years. As well, your Board's Consideration of the 30 year history and support of Quarterama and the Ontario Quarter Horse Association of your facility and city would be appreciated.

2 MILLION DOLLAR IMPACT

And so yet another naturally, Quartermama begins.

The impact that Quartermama has on the horse industry is tremendous and is acknowledged by all involved, but little thought has been given in the past, to what effect the Quartermama has on the Committee alone, books 10 rooms to house its 200 plus workers for the 3 days that they have to spend at the show. (90 x \$75. x 6) \$34,000.00. Committee members will also spend at least \$25.00 a day on their parking during the week.

When the figures are added up, the amount of money generated by this one week horse show is almost unbelievable.

The American Horse Council has a simple formula (No. of Horse x No. of People x No. of Show Days x Dollars per Day equals Financial Impact) and by using this as a base it can be estimated, to some degree, approximately how much money is spent in the area during the show.

For the seven days of the show there will be a minimum of 1,000 horses stabled in the Horse Palace at all times. It is generally accepted that each horse will have, at least, 3 people with it. For the sake of this survey it can be assumed that each group of three is a family unit that will share accommodations and transportation.

Costs can add up quite rapidly. There are 1,000 motel or hotel rooms, at least \$75.00 per day on the average (1,000 x \$75. x 7) at a total of \$525,000.00 for the week. Each person will spend at least \$25.00 a day for food, pop and snacks (a very modest figure given the cost of such things in Toronto)

x 7) \$325,000.00. Each group will park at the Exhibition grounds (1,000 x \$6. 1995 rates x 7) and this goes straight to the City of Toronto Parking Authority.

The Quartermama Committee alone, books 10 rooms to house its 200 plus workers for the 3

days that they have to spend at the show. (90 x \$75. x 6) \$34,000.00. Committee members will also spend at least \$25.00 a day on their parking (200 x \$25. x 6) or \$40,000.00 in all.

Given the fact that many committee folks are friends and travel back and forth together they probably only use up 50 parking spots (50 x \$6. x 7) costing \$2,100.00.

To account for the Commercial Exhibitors, there are approximately 100 different commercial exhibitors while they are over all picture.

While their financial statements remain confidential, Quartermama is known to operate with an expense budget of between six and seven hundred thousand dollars.

What does Quartermama receive in return?

pears that add up so drastically over the week.

Quartermama has declared a profit (in 1989 just over \$30,000.00) and these monies are either channelled into the treasury of the Ontario Quarter Horse Association or put right back into the next Quartermama. Either of these assignments put the financial group wishing to produce a major horse show will finally have the luxury of deciding where to hold their event, and it could be expected that a bit of competition might wake up the powers that be in Toronto and get them looking at what Quartermama actually does for them.

Other than the head quarters hotel, the Lakeshore Inn, which does help somewhat, the hotels and motels in the area contribute exactly nothing directly or indirectly to Quartermama. Certainly this is a disgusting state of affairs, but Exhibition Place does have a monopoly where big horse shows are concerned.

This article doesn't even begin to address the money spent on items like gas and transportation to and from Toronto, nor does it attempt to estimate how much is actually spent on other goods and services by the exhibitors while they are in Toronto, but even without considering theseus the contribution to the economy of Toronto, by Quartermama is well in excess of two million dollars.

What does Quartermama receive in return? The Park Authority of the City of Toronto receives over \$125,000.00 in revenue because of the show and it responds by generously (?) giving Quartermama 5 free parking passes for the week—a gift worth about \$200.00.

Exhibition Place, which receives over \$100,000.00 in actual rentals, and a great bit more, gives the show absolutely no special consideration. While both the Mayor of Toronto and the Metro Chairman send letters, and pictures,

to Toronto, which are printed in the program, the city or region does not respond with any funding or support for the show, in spite of the fact that it produces over two million dollars for their economy.

The food section area of Exhibition Place (which gets a good portion of the \$80,000.00 plus spent on food during the week) have come to the point that they will actually provide 24 hour food service in the Horse Palace area of the show.

Other than the head quarters hotel, the Lakeshore Inn, which does help somewhat, the hotels and motels in the area contribute exactly nothing directly or indirectly to Quartermama. Certainly this is a disgusting state of affairs, but Exhibition Place does have a monopoly where big horse shows are concerned.

At the present time there is no other facility in the province of Ontario that can host a major, international horse show such as Quartermama and it does seem that the management of Exhibition Place, the municipal government and all of the local hotels and restaurants are more than aware of the fact.

There is a faint glimmer of hope on the horizon. The Western Fair Grounds in London, Ontario can presently offer almost everything needed to house Quartermama. The Location is excellent, with sufficient hotels,

people. There are currently 600 permanent box stalls, with lots of areas for temporary stalls and for commercial exhibits.

What it presently lacks is a coliseum with a large enough show ring and adequate seating for spectators, but they do have the land and even the plans with which to build one.

When the proper funding is obtained and the facility built, at the Western Fair Grounds, the OQHA and any other group wishing to produce a major horse show will finally have the luxury of deciding where to hold their event, and it could be expected that a bit of competition might wake up the powers that be in Toronto and get them looking at what Quartermama actually does for them.

In the meantime, Quartermama will continue to attract these thousands of people many of them from outside the province and, indeed, quite a few of them from out of the country and

Quartermama is well recognized within the horse world for its major impact upon the horse industry, but it seems that it has an even bigger impact on the economy at large, and it is certainly about time that this contribution receives the respect and support that it, so


