# TTC Track Replacement and Watermain Replacement at Dufferin Street and Springhurst Avenue/ Fort Rouille Street

Contract: 23ECS-RD-11SP

#### Start Date: Early September, 2023 End Date: End-December, 2023 \*Timeline is subject to change.

The City of Toronto and Toronto Transit Commission will be renewing aging streetcar tracks on Springhurst Avenue from Dufferin Street to Fort Rouille Street, including the Dufferin Street loop. The City will also replace the watermain and the City-owned portion of substandard water services on Fort Rouille Street and Springhurst Avenue, from east of Dufferin Street to Fort Rouille Street.

The water service is the underground pipe that brings water to your water meter and is owned by you <u>and</u> by the City. The part you own is from your house to the end of your property, the part the City owns is from the end of your property to the watermain.

The construction work on Dufferin Street and Springhurst Avenue will be completed in 2 phases. Phase 1 involves watermain replacement on Springhurst Avenue, while Phase 2 includes TTC track replacement. Phase 2 will require a FULL INTERSECTION CLOSURE at Dufferin Street and Springhurst Avenue, including the Dufferin Street loop, from October to December 2023.


This project will be coordinated with the emergency repairs of the Dufferin Street Bridge.

This work is required to bring the aging infrastructure to a state of good repair and is part of the Council-approved 2023 Capital Works Program.

### IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT LEAD WATER SERVICES

If you live on Springhurst Avenue or Fort Rouille Street in a house that was built before the mid-1950s, your water service may be made of lead. Please read the attached fact sheet with important information about the risks of lead in drinking water, especially if someone in your house is pregnant, there are children under six years old, or there is an infant drinking formula made using tap water.

- Work crews will mark the locations of underground utilities, such as gas, water and cable so that the construction work does not interfere with these utilities.
- Affected properties will receive a Construction Notice approximately two weeks before work begins with more information about the work.
- The City will not be responsible for damage to any privately owned items on City property

| 24             | Work Hours: Work on this project will take place 24 hours, 7 days a week.<br>Excavation activities and heavy breaking will be carried out at various times throughout the day. Concrete breaking work is the most disruptive and will typically last the first 1-2 days for each phase of the construction. Around-the-clock work during rail installation by TTC is required to preserve the integrity and quality of new rail and concrete. Overnight rail work by TTC may consist of moving new rail into position, rail installation, and rail welding/grinding.   |

| ₽<br>          | Access to Your Home: The City-hired contractor may need access to the interior and exterior of your home to complete a pre-construction condition survey. Affected properties will receive a request to schedule a time to complete the pre-construction condition survey. Although participation is voluntary, the pre-construction survey results may be useful to confirm claims for the potential damage caused by City construction.  |
| <b>L</b>       | <b>Substandard Water Service Replacement:</b> Please read the attached fact sheet as it contains important information about lead in drinking water and water service replacement. First, find out if your water service is lead – a licensed plumber can help you with this. If it is lead, the City of Toronto encourages you to replace it.
